Dental care for kids

Barwon Health's Oral Health Service is continuing its early intervention program Wide Smiles, visiting thousands of students across Geelong this year.

Led by Dr Michael Smith and Sharon Lewis, Barwon Health developed a method to improve the oral health of children by visiting 44 kindergartens and 25 schools.

During the 2018 school year, children received two dental check-ups and were provided with toothbrushes and toothpaste. Students with early 'white spot' decay had fluoride varnish applied.

Parent engagement sessions were also

conducted and information on sugar content in different foods was shared. To date, more than 16,000 children have benefited from the program.

Children at Northern Bay College requiring dental procedures benefited from Barwon Health's outreach dental van, which is equipped to provide a variety of more complex dental treatments.

2018 was the third year the program has operated at Northern Bay College's Wexford Campus and the service has now expanded to the school's Peacock Campus. The response from both parents and students has been positive.

Proud career ends in the north

Northern Bay College will begin 2019 with a new principal following the retirement of Fred Clarke, who was the inaugural Principal of Victoria's newest school when it opened in 2011.

Mr Clarke told Northerly Aspects:

"It has been a very long and very eventful roller coaster career which has seen unbelievable changes in our lives.

When I moved to Geelong, I had the chance to work with a large number of schools through the Regional Office. This was one of the important reasons why I wanted to work on the emerging plans for a great new school in the northern suburbs.

Between 2006 and 2009 the state schools in the north desperately needed to be revitalised in many ways, but mainly in the infrastructure. Each school needed extensive renovation and so did Corio and Norlane.

Some fantastic community members, businesses, services, the council and education sites came together in a regeneration project for the north, which is still going on. The nine local schools merged into one school with five campuses.

The plans were still to have local schools for younger students and a central senior campus. So, the five

current sites were selected and all were to be totally redeveloped and up graded.

I'm very happy to have been the first College Principal and have been really pleased with the new facilities which provide modern, attractive learning spaces for our students and young people.

My big disappointment is that we've never had funding to change the senior campus and the buildings look very much as they did many years ago. Perhaps the next budget will provide the elusive funding for construction of a state-of-the-art Senior School.

It will be difficult for a while to sleep in on a weekday this year because for 50 years my work has been centred on putting things in place so that children can learn to their fullest potential.

However, I'll think about how technology is changing the way children learn, that our new Australian families are so welcome in this country and their children have amazing potential for success.

I'll think of the extraordinary opportunities that Northern Bay College gives to families who don't have the kind of resources that more affluent communities have. I hope the children attending Northern Bay College now

and for many years in the future will be learning in a safe, nurturing, positive and exciting school.

I have selected this picture as perhaps my last picture in Northerly Aspects because I think it represents very well what I value. I met Chantelle at the old Corio Primary and have watched her success, challenges and resolve to be the best person she can be with a strong vision of knowing that study and commitment will bring her a future.

In Nazdana, we have a student who represents the many wonderful communities we have in Northern Bay College who embrace the opportunity to learn and be safe in schools. These young women have been my final College School Captains.

I have been very happy and proud to have been the inaugural Principal and wish my successor, every colleague, every family and especially every student a wonderful and successful 2019."

Pipe Band Championships in Corio

Goldsworthy Reserve in Corio will host the 2019 Victorian Pipe Band Championships as part of the Geelong Highland Gathering on Sunday, March 17.

The 2019 Gathering will mark 162 years since the first Geelong Highland Gathering was held on New Year's Day 1858 and will be the 62nd event in the modern era, which began in 1958.

Being awarded the pipe band championships again is recognition by Pipe Bands Victoria of the calibre of the Geelong Highland Gathering Association. Geelong was the permanent home of the State Championships for the decade up to 2009.



More than 20 pipe bands, including interstate entries, are expected to compete. In 2018 the Geelong event was the second biggest Pipe Band Contest in the country, after the 2018 biennial Australian Pipe Band Championships held in Brisbane.

The 2019 Gathering will see all the usual events, including the South Pacific Heavy Scottish Games Championships, Highland dancing competitions, 42nd Highland Regiment Re-Enactment

Group, Long Sword demonstrations, vintage cars, Clan and Heritage Association tents.

A highlight of the day will be the Massed Pipe Bands at the end of the day's activities. There will be a Scottish Faire market with food (including haggis), souvenir, clothing stalls and free children's activities including a petting zoo and jumping castle.

Admission costs are adults \$15; concession \$10; children 5 to 16 years \$8; under 5 free; family (2 adults and 2 children) \$40. There are no ATM facilities on the day.

Building for an exciting future

Residents of the 3214 area will have access to state-of-the-art community facilities when major Neighbourhood House building projects are completed this year.

A new Rosewall Neighbourhood Centre is being built behind the current facility in Sharland Road. The \$3.76 million facility will be known as the Rosewall Community Hub.

The new Rosewall will provide all the usual services of the neighbourhood centre, but in a more modern and comfortable environment. The building will be finished in 2019 and feature modern facilities including a pottery room and kiln, hospitality training kitchen and outdoor decking areas.

The Cloverdale Community Centre, in Purnell Road, is also in the midst of a major upgrade. The first part of an

extension and refurbishment of the rear of the existing building will be completed in early 2019. Following that, the front of the building will be upgraded.

The centre runs a wide range of preaccredited training and programs, some of which were relocated during the building process. All programs are returning to Cloverdale to start Term 1.

Coasthaven Community to open soon

The Baptcare Coasthaven Community, located at 45 Robin Avenue, Norlane will open in March this year.

It will offer a 90-place residential aged care facility and a Community Hub that will include a café, community garden, men's shed and playground.

Immunisation numbers are up

The most recent national immunisation data shows that immunisation rates in Greater Geelong are higher than the national average for young children.

The data showed that Greater Geelong immunisation rates were above the national average in all age groups for children up to five-years-old and equal to or higher than Victoria's average for the same age groups. The data also showed Greater Geelong's Indigenous immunisation rates for children exceeded state and national rates across the same age groups.

The City's immunisation program, run through Barwon Health, includes free immunisations for children and other eligible residents for vaccinations listed on the National Immunisation Program.

In 2017, Barwon Health immunised more than 23,000 people, protecting children against a range of diseases, including diptheria, hepatitis B, influenza, measles, mumps, rubella, meningococcal, whooping cough, polio, tetanus and chickenpox.

Serving community in many ways

Corio Norlane Lions Club has celebrated six years of serving the local community through a range of programs and activities

The club has been running a bike program for almost three years. Members obtain secondhand bicycles either by purchase or donation, clean them, repair them and paint them and then give them away. So far, the club has provided more than 1600 bikes to children and families.

Members are planning to build a shed to support a Work for the Dole Program, to provide support for locals and refugee families to improve their job skills. Member John McKinnin has received enormous satisfaction and praise for supporting this program.

The Lions club's breakfast program has been reviewed and now provides \$1000 per term to Northern Bay College, Goldsworthy Road campus where the canteen provides a healthy breakfast and now supports up to 60 students per morning.

The Winter Blanket Appeal is now called Road Home Geelong and between March and October each year members collect blankets, jackets, hats, scarves, gloves and hygiene items. All items are distributed to the homeless throughout Geelong via the local agencies. This appeal also encourages people to talk about and consider the desperation of the homeless and their families.

The club's computer program has been running for six years, where secondhand computer equipment is cleaned and software installed, then donated to families. More than 400 computer systems have been delivered to families.

Corio Norlane Lions members hold barbecues at ALDI Corio on the second Saturday of each month to raise money to support the breakfast program. The Lions Golden Opportunity Community Shop at 55 Alkira Avenue, Norlane is also doing well, staffed by volunteers.

The club is aiming to involve students and young adults in community projects. Elected for another term

Since the last edition of Northerly Aspects, we have held a state election.

Avalon Airport is international

Victoria's second international terminal is open for business, with the new Avalon International Airport to provide an alternative for Victorian travellers and international tourists.

In early December I attended the official opening to celebrate the completion of the \$38 million project, supported by the Andrews Government, which will create 187 jobs at Avalon Airport.

Construction of the 7000 square metre new terminal and extending the existing terminal created 80 jobs and now that the project is complete, it's expected to deliver significant flow on benefits to regional industries.

AirAsia is now flying twice daily between Avalon and Kuala Lumpur, bringing over 440,000 passengers



through the airport annually, on top of the existing 250,000 annual domestic passengers.

The addition of Air Asia X flying to Avalon Airport is expected to create a massive boost to local tourism, with more visitors from Asia arriving to visit Geelong, the Bellarine and the Great Ocean Road.

The new international airport will also boost Victorian exports – with the new terminal having capacity to export around 14 tonnes of freight every day to more than 130 destinations.

The State Government has been a strong backer of Avalon – helping secure Jetstar's future at the airport and investing \$1.5 million in infrastructure works at the new industrial precinct, which will be home to 750 jobs by 2026, including Cotton On Group's purpose-built distribution centre.

The opening marked an important milestone in the growing opportunities for international flight services operating through Avalon Airport which has the potential to create even more new jobs in the future.

\$1.2 million Corio athletics renewal

Corio's Goldsworthy Reserve athletics track is receiving a major renewal, with works started on a \$1.2 million upgrade, including full track resurfacing, at the popular community facility.

The project includes removal of the existing track surface to be replaced with a new IAAF synthetic rubber surface. Improvements to drainage, kerbing and pavement areas around the track will also be completed as part of the upgrade as well as new long and triple jump facilities.

Underground works will be required to remove tree roots that have damaged the old track and surrounding areas. while root barriers will be installed around existing trees to protect the

track from future damage.

The popular track is home to the Corio Little Athletics Centre, which includes Bell Park, Corio South, Corio West, Golden Plains and Lara little athletics clubs. It's also used by a host of primary and secondary schools in the north for their annual athletics carnivals and PE classes.

The surrounding Goldsworthy Reserve also hosts major events, including the annual Scottish celebrations for the Geelong Highland Gathering, held in March each year.

Work is expected to be completed in March, with the project fully funded by the City of Greater Geelong. The

athletics track is closed during the work and the Corio Little Athletics Centre's meets are being held at Landy Field on Sundays.

Cr Anthony Aitken, Co-Chair Social and Infrastructure Planning and Windermere ward councillor, said: "I'm thrilled to see these much-needed track upgrades getting underway. It's a great result not only for the Corio Little Athletics Club, but also for local schools and residents in our north.

"The upgrade will ensure the Goldsworthy Reserve athletics track continues to be an important community sports facility, providing the opportunity for future national athletic stars to develop from our north."

A busy year for Council

Windermere ward councillors Kylie Grzybek and Anthony Aitken have contributed the following information for 3214 residents:

"Towards the end of 2018 we ticked past 12 months since our election as councillors. It's been an honour to represent Geelong's north during the past year. We've especially enjoyed connecting with the many wonderful people and groups who volunteer their time for our community.

Pleasingly, Council has recognised the need for new facilities and services in the north, and there are many exciting projects happening.

Behind the Rosewall Neighbourhood Centre we're building a brand new, \$3.76 million facility, which will be known as the Rosewall Community Hub. This will provide all the services of the neighbourhood centre, but in a far more modern and comfortable environment.

The new Rosewall will have state-of-the art facilities including a pottery room and kiln, hospitality training kitchen, and outdoor decking areas. We're looking forward to seeing it finished in 2019.

The Cloverdale Community Centre is also in the midst of a major upgrade, with an extension and refurbishment of the existing building. The centre runs a number of fantastic programs for local groups, so this is another very worthwhile investment.

In September we turned the first sod on the new \$13.3 million Purnell Road Child and Family Centre. This building will bring local day care, kindergarten, maternal child health and playgroups together in one outstanding new venue. Council is providing \$11.7 million of the funding, with the state government putting in \$1.6 million.

And it's fantastic to see work getting going on the new athletics track at Goldsworthy Reserve. The Corio Little Athletics Club campaigned successfully for \$1.26 million to fund this project, and we were really pleased to include it in our Council budget for 2018–19.

Our focus on the important Northern ARC Health and Wellbeing Hub on the Waterworld site also continues. Our architects have given us some initial concepts, which are very, very exciting. Council's commitment of \$20.6 million for this project still stands, and we won't rest until we've secured matching funding from state and federal governments.

We look forward to working with the community in 2019 to make sure the north continues to receive the love and attention it deserves."

Free Wi-Fi and better broadband



It was all eyes on phones (and internet speed) at the funding announcement at Norlane Community Centre.

The Victorian State Government has provided the City of Greater Geelong with a \$1.8 million grant to provide enhanced broadband services and expand the free Wi-Fi network throughout the northern suburbs.

The grant is great news for residents and businesses in Geelong's northern suburbs as it will help address issues

around digital connectivity and disparities of access.

The importance of the community having digital access is reflected in the City's clever and creative vision and a measure of success for this vision is for Greater Geelong to achieve a Digital Inclusive Index score greater than 70. Currently the region ranks at 58.7.

The enhanced broadband services will help achieve this by providing internet speeds up to 10 times faster than currently available. People will be able to download up to 1GB free a day, with 135 Wi-Fi access points across 34 locations. The City will consult with the local community early in 2019 to determine the final and most beneficial locations for the free Wi-Fi.

'Places and Spaces' feedback

The City of Greater Geelong recently asked the community about how people use and value 'Places and Spaces' across the City.

The survey, which is now closed, asked participants what they use now, if there is anything they can't easily access and why.

The information from the survey will be included in a report that will be

available in early 2019. The report will also include feedback from 'Meet and Talk' sessions that were held with community groups. The report will be available at geelongaustralia.com.au.

These insights will combine with data and evidence to help shape future planning, provision, investment and decision making about community places and spaces.

More than 1000 people contributed their thoughts and ideas. This participation is valued and speaks loudly about the importance of community places and spaces to connecting, learning, having fun and being active. They play a key role in the health and wellbeing of our community.

Be sensible in summer

During summer you must consider what is sensible, so save gardening until cooler times of the day. Early morning and late afternoon are better for both you and your plants.

Check that moisture is getting through your mulch to where it's needed – often mulch can crust up in dry conditions and create a barrier to water getting through.

If you have heavy clay soil don't waste time and money adding a soil-wetting agent to your watering can because it won't help. If you mix a plentiful quantity of organic matter, and maybe a little sand, it will improve the structure of your soil and allow the water to penetrate.

If you're using pine bark or wood chips as mulch, mix in a nitrogen-rich fertilizer before applying to garden beds. It replaces the nitrogen lost from the soil in the process of the mulch breaking down and your plants will prosper.

Summer is the best time to install an irrigation system. This will keep all your plants moist and looking fantastic without wasting water. Ensure your trees and larger shrubs survive the heat of summer by building a moat around them which can fill with water. This way the water will do the most good and not just run away.

You have to be cruel to be kind when your vegie garden is overcrowded with seedlings – by thinning them out you will end of with a better yield and you can pass the unwanted plants onto another gardener.

Keep an eye on any pots in the garden and if you find that the soil has shrunk away from the sides, allowing the water to run straight through the pot, it's time to soak the pot in a bucket of water with a bit of wetting agent in it. This will hydrate the soil, enabling it to soak up water in the future.

Fill the bucket so that the top of the pot is below the water level – you'll see

bubbles coming to the surface – this is the air that has been trapped in the dry soil. When the bubbles stop you can lift the pot out and allow any excess water to drain

The best thing you can do for your lawn during the warmer weather is to leave it a little longer than normal when you cut it. This gives the roots more shelter from the sun, keeps the them wetter for longer, and protects them from the heat.

The next thing on the agenda is getting ready for an autumn display. Have you ever thought of dahlias? They put on a lovely show and are great cut flowers too. Check if the type you choose will need staking as a strong wind can create havoc with the taller varieties if they are not securely tied up.
